# **DeKalb Alternative School and Teachers Responsibilities:**

All classroom teachers will work with students and their families to support students' success in reading and writing constructive responses. Some of our key connections with families will be to:

1) Provide literacy websites and suggested level materials during the four content DAS Parent Engagement Forums' throughout the year at which strategies such as shared reading experiences with peers, teachers, and parents and exploring text for deeper meanings will be taught to parents.

- 2) Present school-wide events such as Curriculum Night and Parental Engagement Forums (4) where parents will have shared reading experiences with students, explore text for deeper meanings and demonstrate best practices in writing constructive responses. Parents will also be provided supplemental materials to create a designated learning space in the home to share in increasing the students' reading comprehension.
- 3) Communicate with parents via: calling logs, DAS web-site, monthly newsletter and flyers to provide strategies that can be used to increase reading comprehension and writing constructive responses. These strategies include having shared reading experiences with students, exploring text for deeper meanings and using a writing scoring rubric.

## Parent/Guardian Responsibilities:

As Parents/Guardians we will:

Parents/Guardians provided input to develop ideas about how families can support students' success in reading and writing. Families may have other ideas to add to this list.

- 1.) Participate in school-wide events such as Curriculum Night and Parental Engagement Forums that focus on shared learning experiences in each Content taught to students, exploring text for deeper meanings and demonstrating best practices in writing constructive responses.
- 3) Read all communication sent by the school and interact with teachers to learn strategies used to increase reading comprehension and improving written constructive responses. These strategies include but are limited to having shared reading experiences with students, exploring text for deeper meanings and using a writing scoring rubric.

# **Students' Responsibilities:**

As the Student, I will:

Students provided input to teachers during ELT and FLP as it pertained to their academic development of learning and how they can succeed in/out of school and enhance their in reading and writing skills. Students presented the following ideas to make connections between learning at home and school:

- 1) Attend all classes to reinforce strategies such as having shared content reading experiences with peers and exploring text for deeper meanings.
- 2) Attend school-wide events with parents such as Curriculum Night and DAS Parental Engagement Forums that focus on shared learning experiences with students through exploring content for deeper meanings and actively demonstrating and facilitating best practices.
- 3) Read personal interest materials i.e., (magazines, books, and web-based articles) daily at home using strategies of having shared reading experiences and improving written constructive responses using a scoring rubric which is aligned to the New DCSD Curriculum.
- 4) Encourage my parents to utilize resources provided during DAS Parent Engagement Forums to enrich my reading comprehension skills.
